State Core Course Description

In this course, students will gain an introduction to the scientific study of human behavior and mental processes. Topics may be drawn from historical and current perspectives in psychology.

In-Class Recording

To "publish" means to share, transmit, circulate, distribute, or provide access to a recording, regardless of format or medium, to another person (or persons), including but not limited to another student within the same class section. Additionally, a recording, or transcript of a recording, is considered published if it is posted on or uploaded to, in whole or in part, any media platform, including but not limited to social media, book, magazine, newspaper, leaflet, or third-party note/tutoring services. A student who publishes a recording without written consent may be subject to a civil cause of action instituted by a person injured by the publication and/or discipline under UF Regulation 4.040 Student Honor Code and Student Conduct Code.

Course Requirements

Chapter Quizzes (80 points). There will be ten chapter quizzes during the semester. Quizzes are designed to assess your understanding of course material to date and to prepare you for the larger FINAL exam. Each quiz contains 10 multiple-choice **applied** questions with each question worth 1 point. The 2 lowest quiz grades will be dropped by the end of the semester; thus, only 8 quizzes will be included in your final grade. **Chapter Quizzes can be found on Canvas under the "Quizzes" tab.**

Writing Assignment (60 points): In this writing assignment you will draw on the psychological knowledge that you have learned, or will be learning, to design a mini-intervention project, implement it on YOURSELF, and reflect about your project outcomes. You will need to at least utilize the knowledge from Chapter 2 on research methods for data collection, display and summary, Chapter 6 on learning and behavior acquisition for intervention planning, and Chapter 11 on emotion and motivation for intervention planning and post-intervention reflection. However, you are encouraged to draw on other chapters and outside resources as applicable. **See Canvas under "Assignments" tab for more info.**

Discussion Posts (70 points): For these assignments, you will be required to watch a video (the link is located on Canvas in each Discussion). Please watch the video and post a reflective response to what was discussed in the talk/video. Your initial discussion post does not have to be long winded, but it must contribute to the conversation. Your discussion may take any form you like (e.g., a question, confusion, elaboration, disagreement). Your initial post should be around 4-5 sentences. Think of these as low stakes writing assignment to stimulate what we might do with each other in class if time permitted. You have good ideas. Share them.

Then, reply to one of your classmates' posts. The idea is to get the conversation going - you can answer someone's question (perhaps with an overlooked fact or with your own opinion, or maybe with a YouTube video?), disagree (civilly, of course), or expand on someone's initial post. Responses that are not sufficient, include "I agree" or "great point"; think deeply and further the conversation in a meaningful way.

A perfect initial discussion post will equal 6 points and a perfect response will equal 4 points, for a total of 10 points. There are 6 Discussion Posts, and they are applied knowledge from a chapter in the textbook. They will be made available when we begin the chapter in class; due dates for each post are listed in the tentative course schedule below. **Discussion Posts can be found under the "Discussion" tab on CANVAS.**

Final exam (50 points). **The final exam will be in final exam week in-person.** You will be given 90 minutes total for the final with 50 items. The final exam is cumulative, thus covers all the material in the course.

There will not be quiz/exam make-up opportunities unless there is an acceptable reason with evidence that is aligned with the UF absence policy (e.g., illness, serious family emergency, special curricular requirements, religious holidays, etc.).
